

Locating Your Library Course Guide


Digital versions of the required readings selected by your Professor are placed on a library course guide by library staff members. The guide is then uploaded into your Canvas course. To find the guide from inside your Canvas course, open the course, click on the 'modules' link in the left side menu, then scroll down to the 'resources' section to find your course guide link.

For this example, we have used AL5324, but you will follow these basic steps with any of your courses for which a Professor tells you they had a Course Guide created.



Open to the Course Reserves Tab

Once you click on the course guide link to open and view, make sure that you are on the Course Reserves tab. You will know you are on the correct tab if it is indigo rather than gray.






Finding Resources




STEP 1: To open an eBook, click the title. You will be taken to a 'detail' page.




STEP 2: Click on the PDF link to read online.
